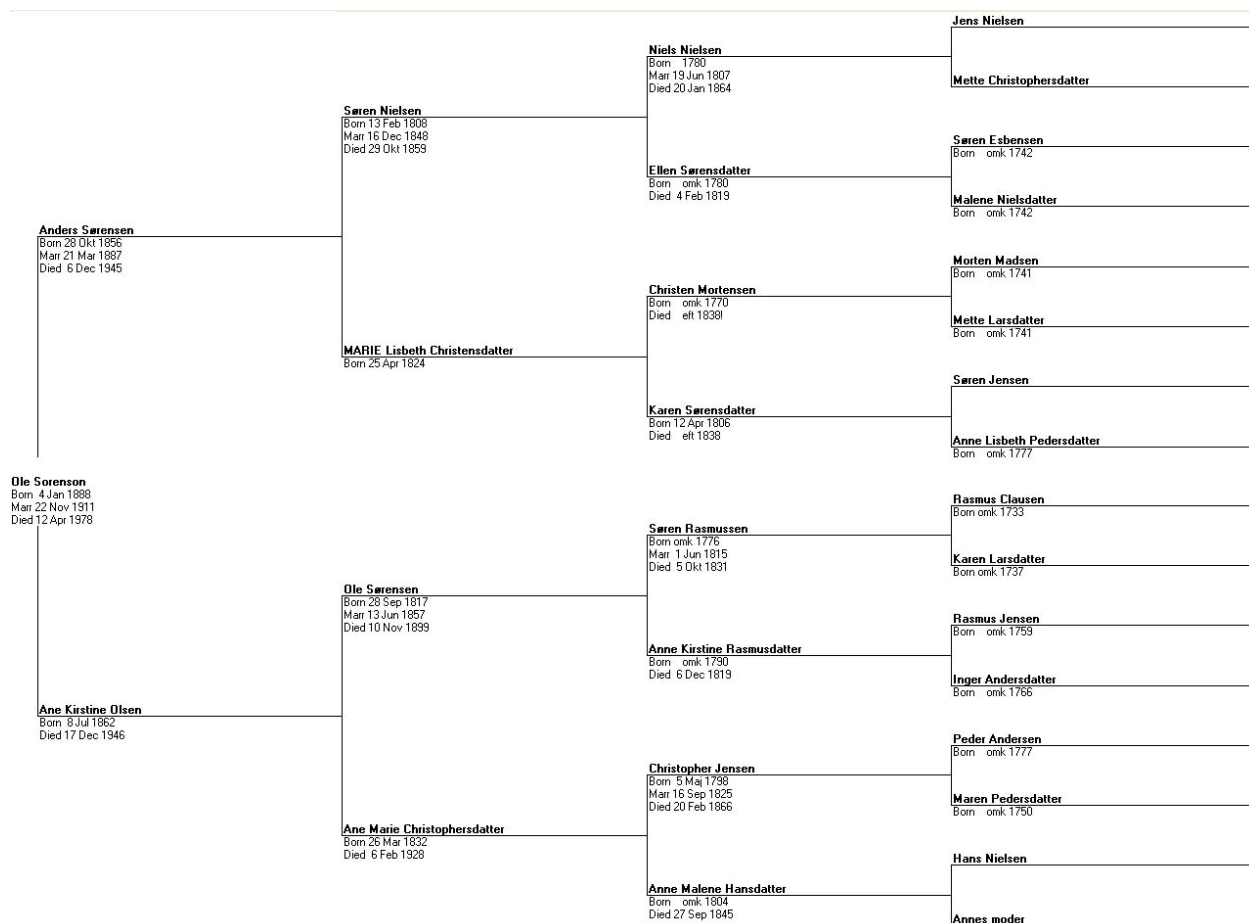

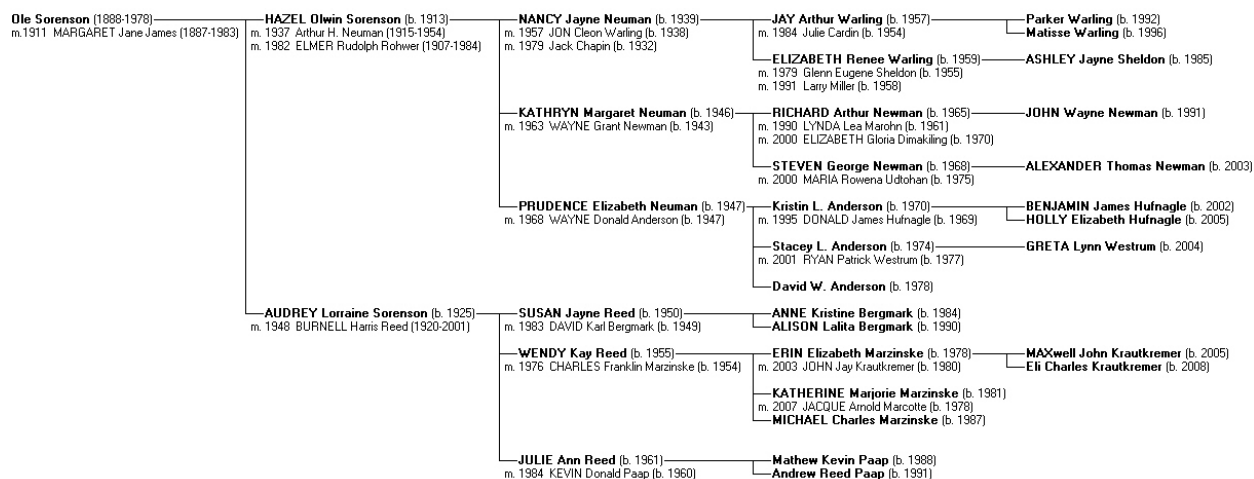

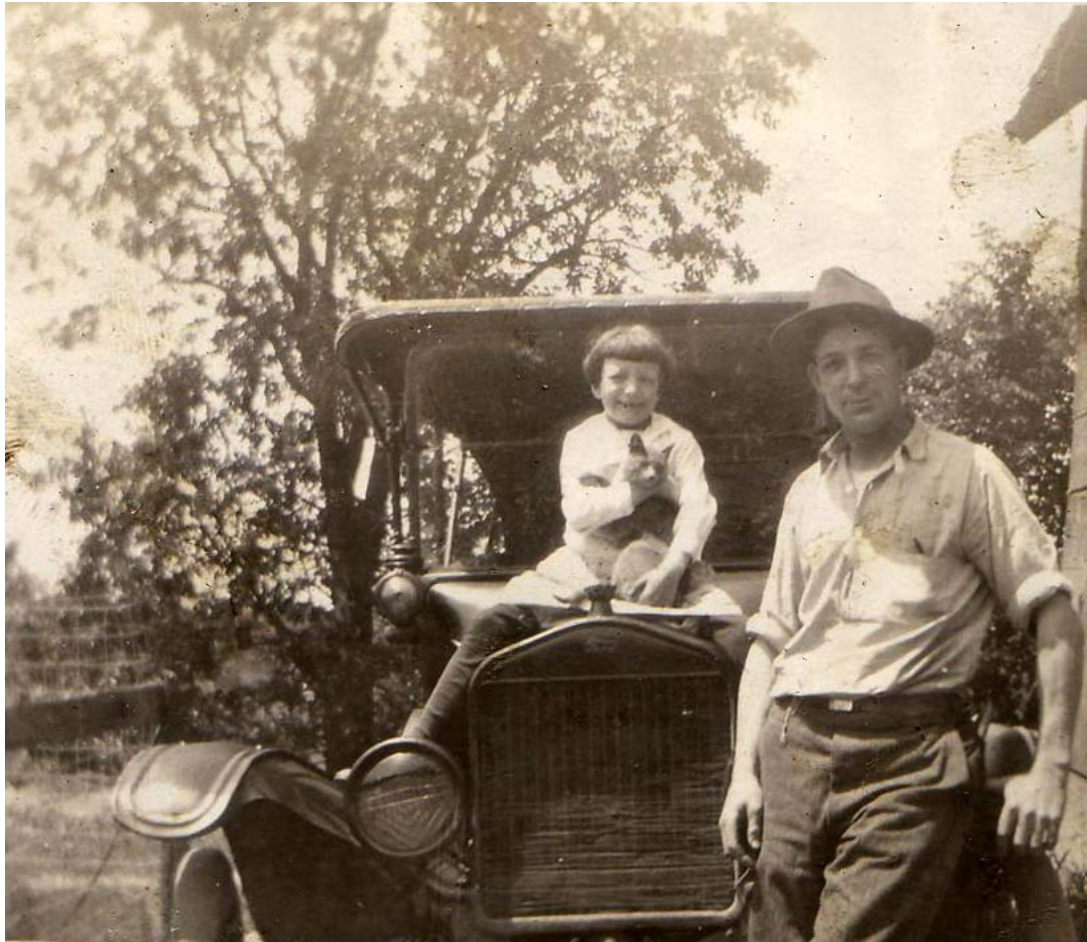

Congenial Custodian Likes Coffee

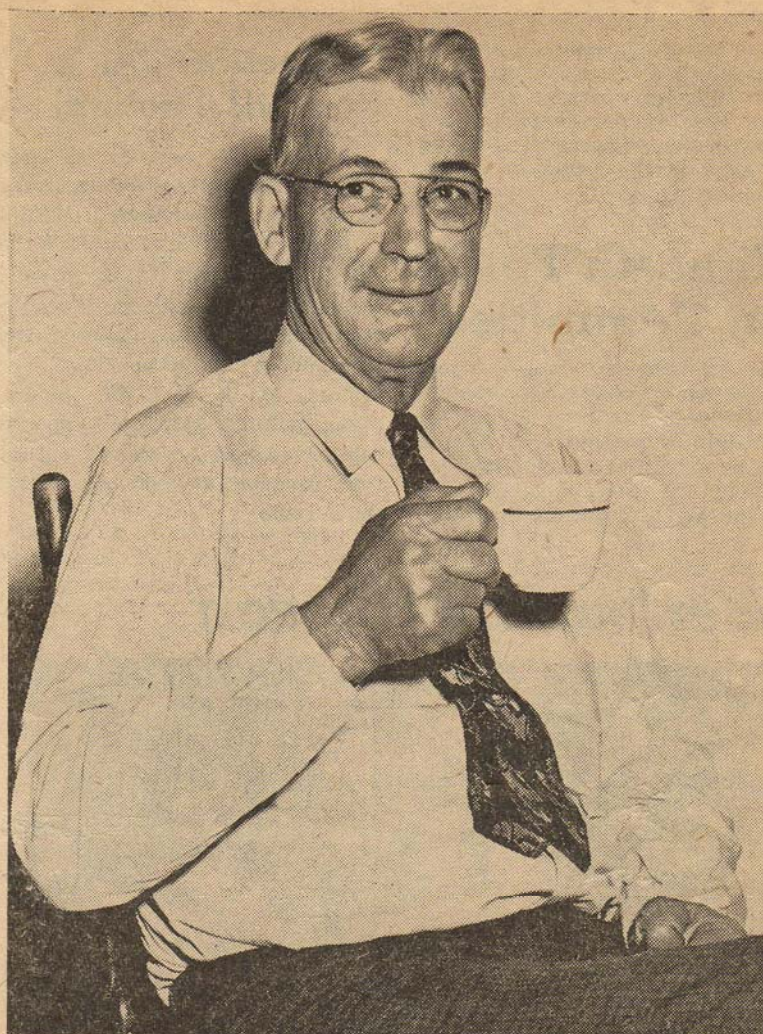
A rare moment in his busy life, Ole Sorenson, our high school custodian, enjoys a hot cup of black coffee.

Coming to school at 2:20 in the afternoon, Ole works right through until between 9 and 11:30 in the evening, with the exception of a few minutes that he takes off for supper, from 5:15 until 5:40. If he arrives early in the afternoon, Mr. Sorenson enjoys a chat with the fellows in the boiler room.

Ole lives in his own home at 104 Florence street with his wife, Margaret, whom he married in 1938 after which he started working as engineer in this building. He had lived in Lake Crystal until he was 23, but the young couple picked Mankato for their new home, "Because Lake Crystal was too small a town for me," he remarked. Ole has two married daughters, Hazel, 36, and Audrey, 26.

A good natured guy, Ole sometimes gets angry with kids who get into places they're not supposed to be, kicks them out, and has a smile for them the next time he sees them—and the kids smile right back. He especially recalls the time he refused five boys when they asked to be let into the gym. After the boys threatened to go to Kris, he heard them running up and down second floor hall. He promptly ordered them out of the building and as he did, he discovered that the five boys had become three. As the boys ambled outside and sat on the steps Ole noticed them looking upward toward the building roof. Thinking the other two boys must be up there, he began climbing the steps toward the trap door leading to the roof. When he arrived, no one was in sight. He hurried back down the stairs and saw the two boys joining the first three in run away from the school. Upon checking, he discovered the boys had jumped from the roof to the grade side level some 26 feet braking the hinges on that trap door, and escaping down the stairs.

Ole was asked. "Yup, and they act like a couple of freshly licked puppies, but they're my friends now," he replied.

Another incident he vividly remembers occurred back in about 1943 at two in the morning. Ole was on night duty then, as engineer. Usually about this time of night he went for a coke from the machine that used to be in the cafeteria. This particular night he found his way without lights, but when he arrived at the machine he found a sign labeled "broke." He turned around, and in the dim light he saw, not a yard away, two women and two men.

The four began to run, Ole following. He frantically searched for light switches, but when he got to them, the strangers had disappeared.

Who says a custodian's life is unexciting?

Mr. Sorenson has enjoyed working with the evening school clubs, class play casts, dance committees, and all the other activities that have taken place during his past 12 years of service to MHS.

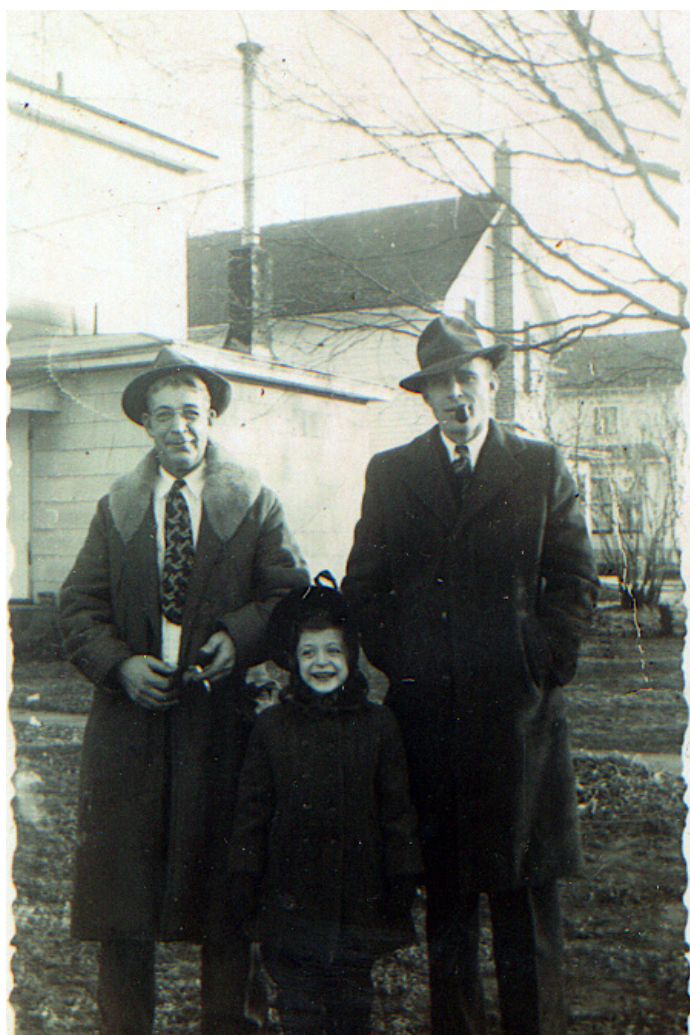

Patches Begins 4th Year As School 'Patrolman'

"The one, absolute, unselfish friend that man can have in this selfish world, the one that never deserts him, the one that never proves ungrateful or treacherous, is his dog." These are the words of Senator George Graham in his "Eulogy on the Dog."

Such a dog as Graham spoke of has been an unselfish friend to hundreds of school children in Mankato each day for the past three years. On Tuesday, the opening day of school, "Patches,"

as he is called, began his fourth year as an unofficial employe of the city. The one man who could tell the most about the service this dog has been performing for these three years is Ole Sorenson. Sorenson is one of several men hired by the city to safeguard school children at cross walks of busy intersections near Mankato's schools during the hours when the children are crossing the streets on their way to and from

on the corner Tuesday morning when Sorenson arrived for the first day of school. "He doesn't seem to be able to tell the days of the week though," Ole related. "I sometimes see him on the corner on Saturday and Sundays." "Once in awhile he will follow me to my home" (107 Florence street), Ole related, "but he goes back to the corner or home when I go in the house." Patches is at home at 823 South Broad street, near the intersection where he "works." He is the pet of the B. H. Chesley, Jr., family, especially of the two Chesley children, Ann and Robert. Sorenson, who was an engineer and janitor at the Lincoln and Mankato high schools for 17 years before he retired and became flagman at the busy intersection, rates Patches as the best helper he could have in safeguarding the children at the busy intersection

school. Ole's station is at one of the busiest intersections in Mankato where five streets meet near Lincoln grade and junior high school and St. John's parochial schools, commonly known as "five corners." Beginning his fourth year as flagman at the corner, Ole has had one friend and helper each day of the year. This helper, of the canine variety, is a large Springer Spaniel with a brown and white curly coat which on seeing him explains the name, "Patches." In the three previous years Patches has been "man's best friend" to Ole and the hundreds of children who pass the crossing each day. Telling about Patches, Ole says that the dog takes over where he leaves off, Ole safeguards the

Crossing guard rules dangerous intersection

When Ole Sorenson retired as a school janitor, he took it easy for awhile and then agreed to help out a couple of months as a school crossing guard.

That was 15 years ago.

Now, just past his 80th birthday, he is still at it — rain or shine, subzero weather or warm.

The crossing he has guarded at Jefferson School for the past eight years is recognized as possibly the most hazardous in the

school system, but he has an accident-free record.

The good-natured face must have made him a grandpa image for many of his young charges, and he shows that kind of concern in getting them safely across the street.

Sorenson lets nothing distract him when he is working. His alert eyes continually scan all directions for approaching cars and children.

The location at the James Avenue bend is particularly dif-

ficult in that it has barely one block visibility from a sharp curve on one side and a hill rising out of the James Avenue valley on the other.

While parents, teachers and city and school officials have tried to figure out ways of reducing the hazards at that corner over the years, he has gone about his business day to day getting the children safely across the street.

His alertness and good judgment have proven to be the best safety measure so far.

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"I don't stop a car unless I absolutely have to," he related. He doesn't allow the children to step onto the street until he is sure the way is safe.

"Stay right there," he warns girls nearing the crossing as a car approaches. They obey.

"Now come across," he says as he lowers his stop flag.

Even when it's 25 below zero, Sorenson reports to his post, about four blocks from his home at 104 Florence St. He has to be there three times a day — 8 a.m. to 8:30 a.m., 11:15 to 1 p.m. and 2:45 to 4 p.m.

He is one of 10 such crossing guards who play a vital part in the safety of youngsters going and coming to school each day.

They are usually retired men because of availability, coupled with reliability, at scattered hours. Their windblown posts are not envied by passing motorists on cold winter days.

Although their responsibility is the safety of school children,

they are employed by the city because of their location on city streets.

Sorenson is the senior in terms of service related to the welfare of school children. He has been a school crossing guard since 1954 and worked in school maintenance for 15 years before that.

A licensed boiler engineer most of his adult life, he went to work for the Mankato school system in 1938 at Lincoln School.

"I applied at the old high school," he said. "There were quite a few of us applying. I had to sign a paper that I wouldn't smoke around the school. I decided that before I'd hide it I'd quite altogether. I haven't smoked since."

He got the job.

Starting as night shift boiler engineer, he became main floor janitor about 1945. When he started at Lincoln School, it was an elementary and junior high, but when the old high school burned down in 1941 he saw those students pour in there too, no easy job for a maintenance man.

The new high school was ready by 1951 and when the student body moved over from Lincoln, he did too. He remained there until arrival of his 65th birthday in 1953 forced him to retire from the school job.

"Superintendent J. E. Anderson and I retired together," he recalls. "He hired me."

After a half year of taking it easy as a retired man, he was contacted in winter of 1954 by Police Chief Stan Christ.

"He asked if I'd help out as a crossing guard a couple of months. I didn't think it'd be this long."

Sorenson worked as crossing guard at the five corners intersection below Lincoln School from 1954 until moving over to Jefferson School in 1962.

Over the years, he has seen the little tots he helped cross the street grow into adults.

"Some of the kids I used to take across the street you see

come along with kids of their own now," he said.

With all the children he helps across the street, he notices when one is absent.

One of his pleasantest memories during his years at the five corners intersection was of a dog, not his own, which would come down to help whenever it was time for the youngsters to cross the street.

"But he'd get his days mixed up. Sometimes I'd see him waiting there on Saturdays."

While he refuses to use rough language on the children, his orders for safety are firm. School discipline backs him.

"I never give in," he said.

As a regular at Jefferson School, where he goes inside to warm up and have coffee, he has been accepted as a part of the school community. Teachers give him Christmas presents and even treated him to a special cake on his most recent birthday.

He doesn't have any plans for retiring.

"It keeps you busy," he said. "I don't like to sit around."

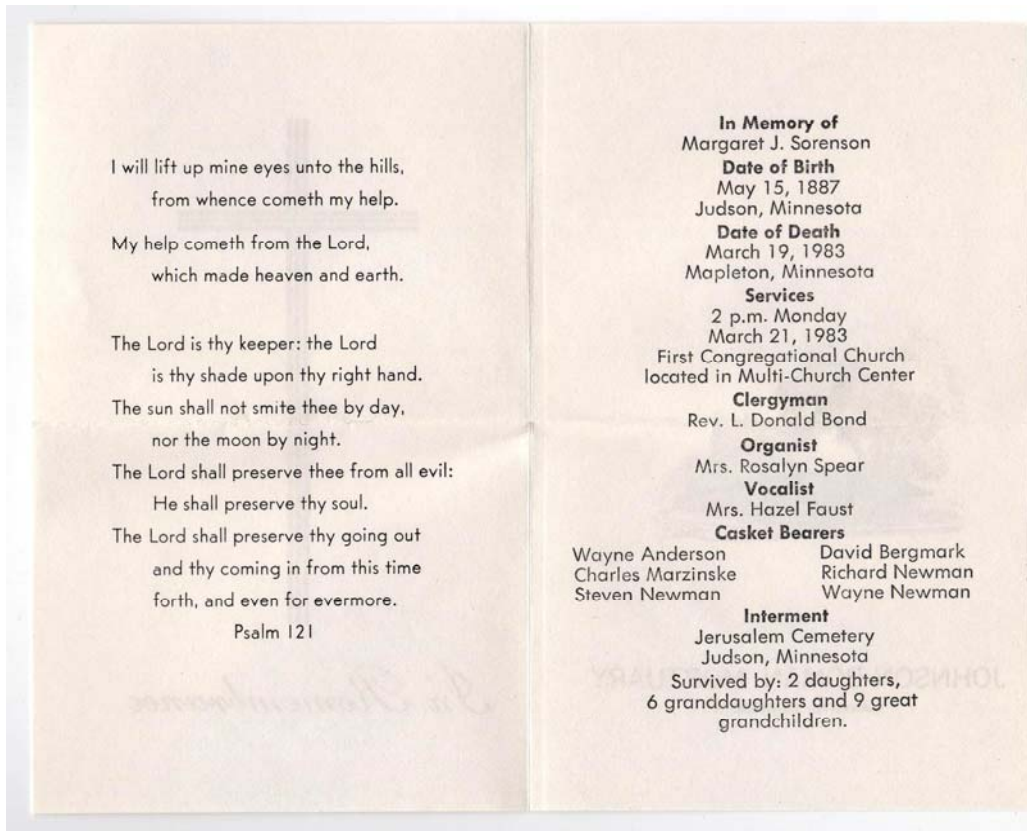
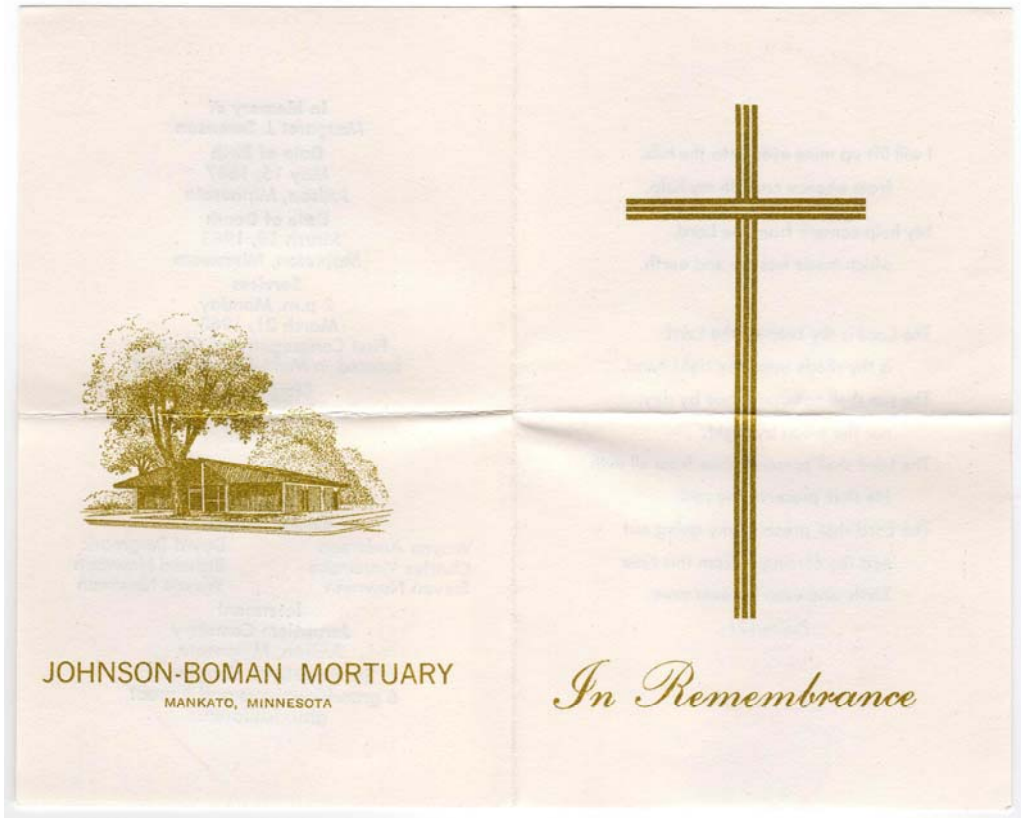
